Students Explore the Current Refugee Crisis

Juniors and seniors in Mark Cline Lucey's "Modern United States History in a Global Context" class role played the United Nations High Commissioner of Refugees having an emergency meeting to discuss and attempt to resolve the humanitarian crisis that is the millions of refugees attempting to enter Europe after fleeing from Syria on Friday. The goal of this committee session was to establish a way to ensure humane conditions for refugees in existing camps, safe passage and asylum, and continued safety in Europe for refugees.

Drawing lessons from the post-World War II refugee crisis in Europe, and throughout the 20th century, the eighteen students in this class decided to explore the complexity of the current crisis via a Model United Nations format. Two student, Ceile Kronick '17 and Anna Leffler '18, served as the committee chairs, and the other sixteen students all represented countries involved in the current situation in Europe and the Middle East.

Some of the students are old hats at Model UN, and for others this was their first time. All agreed that this was a great way to gain a sense of the complexity and range of perspectives on an international issue like this one.

Hike for Hunger



Global March for the Elephants and Rhinos - Sunday, October 4th Taegen Yardley, VCS '21

Please join us for Burlington's first Global March for the Elephants and Rhinos on October 4th in Burlington. For the first time, Vermonters will be able to march in solidarity with thousands of people around the world who will march as one voice, in over 130 marches held across the globe to put an end to the ivory and rhino horn trade. Unless action is taken now, we will lose these majestic and intelligent creatures in just 5-10 years.

BACKGROUND: My name is Taegen Yardley. I am a 7th grader from Charlotte. I first became passionate about saving elephants in 2013 when I was invited by wildlife activists Ashley McAvey and Laurel Neme to help with a bake sale to raise money to help save the elephants. Along with several other students, I cooked baked goods to sell at a screening of the documentary "Battle for the Elephants" at UVM. The documentary "Battle for the Elephants" had an enormous impact on me and made me want to act in their defense. I spent a lot of time on the website 96elephants.org educating myself on the importance of keeping elephants on this planet.

This past April I was fortunate enough to be able to testify at the Vermont State House in support of bill H.297 which would ban the sale of ivory in Vermont. This experience motivated me to find other ways to continue to fight for the elephants. I had the opportunity to participate in a Skype session with children in Hong Kong who are also working to help save the elephants. It was great to learn that there are children in other parts of the world who are fighting for the same cause! Since April I have been working to make this march a reality. We now have representatives from 15 schools around Vermont who are helping to raise awareness about this event and this cause.

Here are some facts about the impact the world would see with the extinction of these species...

- An average of 96 elephants are killed each and every day. That's one every fifteen minutes. At this rate, elephants will become extinct within five to ten years.
- Elephants are gentle, intelligent creatures that live together in families. They care for each other and for their children the same way that human beings do.
- They play an important role in protecting the ecosystems in which they live.
- The rain forests in Central Africa are one of our most important resources in fighting climate change. Elephants spread seeds throughout the land, which helps new plants and seeds to grow. The seeds of almost 100 different kinds of trees must pass through the gut on an elephant in order to germinate. Without elephants, African forests will die.
- Research shows that they are altruistic creatures meaning that they have a selfless concern for the welfare of others. What does it say for people if we can't look out for them they way they are able to look out for us.
- Many animals and plants depend on them for survival. They clear bush for plants to grow and to form pathways and waterholes for smaller animals.
- A rhino is slaughtered once every eight hours for its horn.
- The Northern White Rhino may become extinct very soon with only five left in the world.
- The Western Black Rhino became extinct in 2011
- These animals are being brutally killed for their ivory tusks and horns that end up on the black market and fund terrorist organizations all because of greed.
