THE CAMPAIGN FOR VERMONT COMMONS

This year saw the successful launch of the Campaign for Vermont Commons, a multi-year campaign to create a campus that fully supports the intellectual, social, and physical growth of our students while centering our focus on global responsibility and environmental stewardship.

The first significant step toward fulfilling this promise was opening our very own gym in November. Our students' pride in having their own gymnasium shone throughout the basketball season and the Middle School March Madness volleyball season. Additionally, we completed the local permitting process for the Outdoor Education Center, and are looking forward to studying and stewarding its 55 acres.

Energy is mounting to complete the current stage of the Campaign, thereby closing the books on the work that has been done and taking full ownership of the OEC.

E.E. FORD FOUNDATION GRANT

In June 2022, we received a 1:2 matching grant from the E. E. Ford Foundation, providing \$1 for every \$2 we raised in the subsequent 13 months, up to a \$100,000 total match.

Through the generosity of many donors, we met and exceeded this goal in less than a year! We are grateful to everyone who contributed in myriad ways to the effort.

MASTER PLANNING FOR THE VCS CAMPUS & MORE

Excitement is mounting for the next phase of the Campaign for Vermont Commons. Students, families, and faculty have answered surveys and gathered for brainstorming sessions about their vision for VCS's future, providing information about the community's priorities as well as an opportunity for students to think creatively about their VCS experience. Many constructive and doable ideas were generated regarding the ways we use our space and our time. Some of the more popular suggestions included offering classes in financial literacy and other life skills, creating a dedicated performing arts stage, and using our land and grounds to garden and farm.

The master planning process will continue into the fall of 2023. We hope you'll be a part of it!

Bringing Her Whole Self: Kathryn McDermott

STUDENTS IN KATHRYN MCDERMOTT'S SOCIAL

STUDIES CLASSES are asked to think deeply and critically, diving into nuanced issues and their own relationships with history and current events. Together, they have walked in the shadow of the southern border wall while learning about U.S. policy in Central America, discussed the history and meaning of political resistance, explored family histories of immigration and emigration, and learned about lesser-known figures in the Civil Rights movement.

In Kathryn, students get a teacher and a

guide who is thrilled to go on these physical and metaphorical journeys with them. At one point, however, she imagined a different kind of life for herself—one that included devoting herself to the world of politics in Washington. This vision, she admits, was more than a little influenced by too many episodes of *The West Wing*. Somewhere between graduation and Washington, however, she had an inkling that she "was not going to be the next C.J. Craig," (*The West Wing*'s uber-confident press secretary). This moment of hesitation turned out to be an enormous stroke of luck for all of the students whose lives she has touched.

Suspecting that she might enjoy teaching, she applied to an internship program at the Emma Willard School outside Albany, NY. In describing her first year on the job, she said, "It was grueling, but I was simultaneously reminded of the very best parts of being at camp or on a college campus, which appealed to the summer camp part of me." She appreciated seeing the students in their fullness, experiencing them as whole people rather than knowing only their academics.

Kathryn briefly left teaching to enroll in a graduate program in conflict resolution at Georgetown University, but even there, she admits, "I knew that I was developing a lens for the classroom, whether or not I actually did conflict resolution."

After earning her master's degree, she moved to Portland, Oregon with her partner Warren and got her first position at an independent day school. Kathryn reflected, "I loved the vibe at boarding schools and I didn't know if it would be similar at a day school. But the kids demanded to know me as a whole person. And I felt like I could be my whole self there and share that with the students." Additionally, she was able to refine her teaching skills through thoughtful systems of support and accountability that allowed her to dig deep into issues of pedagogy.

When Warren was accepted into UVM's nurse practitioner program, Kathryn was not particularly hopeful that she would find a similar kind of school in northern Vermont that happened to have an opening. At a previous job, however, Kathryn had taught alongside Christie Howell, whose own career path had brought her to Vermont Commons as an English teacher. In connecting with Christie, Kathryn learned that there was indeed a faculty position open for a social studies/6th grade humanities teacher at VCS.

Today, Kathryn is on the verge of completing her fifth year here. She relishes having a meaningful connection between her professional life and her life outside of school, and she particularly cited Encounter Weeks as a vehicle for integrating the two. She noted, "I always felt like I had a 'camp' side and 'teaching' side, and they hadn't always intersected. All of a sudden, being able to share that piece of myself with students felt really deep."

Having found ways to bring different aspects of her life to her work, she decided that the next step would be bringing her students to some of the places and experiences that were most formative for her. One of those places was Algonquin Provincial Park in Ontario where she had spent her summers as a camper and a camp counselor (and where she met her future spouse). When asked what it felt like to bring her students to a place that meant so much to her, she noted, "It was a little scary because I was introducing the kids to this place that was so important. I wondered, 'Will they see the magic?' On the last night, we held a gratitude circle that lasted three hours. Canoe trips are inherently powerful experiences. It wasn't a huge undertaking but something clearly shifted for those kids."

The moment was not lost on Kathryn; it epitomized the feeling of wholeness that she has strived for throughout her teaching career. "Together in that circle," she recollected, "we had this feeling of 'We shared something really powerful. We know this thing together."

VCS 2022 Founders' Alumni Award: **Tyler Lemay '02**

EACH YEAR OUR ALUMNI COMMUNITY

AND FACULTY NOMINATE an alum who is living out the Vermont Commons mission of Scholarship, Community, and Global Responsibility to receive the Founders' Alumni Award. The 2022 winner of this honor was Tyler Lemay, Class of 2002.

Tyler's path to being an emergency physician in Rochester, New York has been a circuitous one. He recalls fondly his classes and classmates from the earliest years of VCS, but he also recalls "barely graduating." Tyler credits his parents and the tireless VCS faculty for teaching him about service, critical thinking, and learning how to learn. He graduated from Alfred University with a BFA in Studio Arts in 2006, focusing on glassblowing and photography. Not exactly the traditional route to medical school!

With degree in hand, Tyler returned to Vermont for three more years of study at the Community College of Vermont and UVM to prepare for medical school. He graduated from the UVM College of Medicine in 2015 and completed his residency in emergency medicine at Duke University Hospital in 2018.

The pandemic and its accompanying challenges struck Tyler's hospital as fiercely as anywhere, and drug and equipment shortages added to the stresses of the time. It was especially difficult for Tyler to know that he could deliver excellent care but for the circumstances that were beyond anyone's control. What remained in his control, however, was the ability to be present for his patients and their families. "It's rewarding," he noted, "to be a human connection for people when they're in some of the worst moments of their lives." He also appreciates the flow state that can be achieved when one is doing the work that they are trained to do, noting, "It's really nice to be able to do the things you're truly good at."

Beyond the hospital, Tyler recharges outside with his family and friends, and makes it back to the Green Mountains about once a month to spend time on his land in Hinesburg.

Looking back, Tyler credits VCS for inspiring his medical career, beginning with a Wilderness First Aid Encounter Week led by VCS co-founder Leah Mital. This spurred him to join his local rescue squad, followed by the ambulance and fire department, and then to take a job in a hospital. Although emergency medicine is his daily work, Tyler still enjoys prehospital and wilderness medicine the most. He functions as medical director for a Rochester-area rescue squad and is rejoining the Camel's Hump Backcountry Rescue here in Vermont.

VCS students and faculty have also been the lucky beneficiaries of Tyler's expertise. In 2015, he and Ben Wang co-led a winter Encounter Week ski trip in the Adirondacks, which inspired him to think about additional ways of supporting the E-Week program. Since 2018, he's worked behind the scenes with Ben and Dexter on emergency response and risk management to expand the school's capacity for managing wilderness adventures.

His extraordinary devotion to helping others and his dedication to serving the community make Tyler the embodiment of the Vermont Commons spirit. Congratulations, Tyler!

Alumni Spotlight Amira Silverman '17



THOSE WHO KNEW AMIRA

SILVERMAN when she was a student at VCS might have thought that she left the school fully formed; she already had the skills, confidence, and experience of someone much older. But VCS was really a springboard to launch her into the next phase of her life (an apt metaphor, since Amira was a circus artist, among other things!). At Skidmore College, she found that she loved her

research-based classes, and wound up double-majoring in Sociology and Spanish, with minors in Gender Studies and Intergroup Relations, otherwise known as IGR. Says Amira, "Along with VCS, IGR is up there in terms of transformative experiences in my life." Within the supportive environment of the school, Amira learned how to facilitate dialogue across differences and appreciate the impact of identity on lived experience.

The years since college have found Amira working in social research, first at Brown University on a study of the impact of peer intervention on intentional firearm use, and currently at NYU, overseeing a team of researchers studying mental health among youth impacted by the child welfare and juvenile justice systems in NYC. The NYU study will assess the effects of various supports for frontline staff in residential facilities on outcomes for the children in their care. Amira was drawn to this particular study because of its focus on structural and systemic change. She reflects, "I'm a systems thinker at heart. I have a hard time putting the onus on individuals without acknowledging the other forces at play."

Amira is currently applying to Ph.D. programs where she plans to conduct research into identity-based violence, particularly the ways in which extreme violence is mirrored in everyday violence and "how we can tackle both simultaneously." About her future field, she says, "I'll basically be going into learning as a career. I am so grateful to VCS for preparing me for this."
